Coming to America: A Moose Story Kevin Colson of Alaska Department of Fish & Game

Baby Salmon Live Here! Jon Gerken of US Fish and Wildlife Service

What's so special about that lake, pond, creek, or river in your backyard? A lot for juvenile Coho Salmon who spend up to four years in freshwater before migrating downstream to the ocean. Why, where, and what they do in that time period can impact their growth, survival and ultimately their ability to spawn as an adult. Jon Gerken has been conducting juvenile Coho studies in the Big Lake area since 2011. Come hear about a two-inch fish that swam 15 miles upstream over 50 days to find a spot to rest for the winter, then swam the same distance downstream in just six days to saltwater. *Photo credit: Katrina Mueller*
